

CEFR Level Descriptors for Languages

If you are not sure of your level please read the descriptions below based on the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (<u>CEFR</u>). Note that these are basic prrequirements to joining a level.

Beginners

- Can understand simple greetings and some individual words but cannot understand the basic topic of a conversation.
- Can only produce simple greetings and a few international words.
- In reading they may understand simple signs and in writing be able to write disconnected words with spelling errors. (CEFR = A1)

Pre-intermediate

- Can recognise and use familiar words and phrases concerning themselves, their family, and their immediate surroundings, and can ask and answer simple questions on these topics.
- Can understand common names, words and simple sentences when reading and listening.
- Can compose short pieces of writing based on biographical information of themselves or others. (CEFR = A1.2)

Intermediate

- Can understand general conversation involving fluent speakers, provided that some allowances are made, or occasional help given.
- Can produce well enough to make relevant contributions and to get satisfactory information from other speakers by questioning as necessary.
- Is functionally competent for all everyday negotiations except when there are completely unpredictable problems.
- In reading can understand the general idea of authentic texts and can write effective communications of information or opinion, but with a number of errors, or problems because of inability to handle some of the more complex structures. (CEFR = B1)
